The spiritual writers sometimes compare the heart to an altar. Prayer internalizes and assimilates the liturgy during and after its celebration. Even when it is lived out "in secret,"⁶ prayer is always prayer of the Church; it is a communion with the Holy Trinity.² CCC - 2662 The Word of God, the liturgy of the Church, and the virtues of faith, hope, and charity are sources of prayer. CCC - 2683 The witnesses who have preceded us into the kingdom,⁴¹ especially those whom the Church recognizes as saints, share in the living tradition of prayer by the example of their lives, the transmission of their writings, and their prayer today. They contemplate God, praise him and constantly care for those whom they have left on earth. When they entered into the joy of their Master, they were "put in charge of many things." Their intercession is their most exalted service to God's plan. We can and should ask them to intercede for us and for the whole world

GLIMPSES OF THE BOTTOM LINE: TWENTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

FIRST READING

ISAIAH 66:18-21

I come to gather nations of every language; they shall come and see my glory.

Think about the serials you watch regularly on television, or the news stories you follow eagerly as events unfold. What invests you in one particular saga more than others? What are the elements that make this story worth pursuing? Often, what drives our interest in a drama, whether fictional or current events, is the people involved. Will they survive the circumstances that have befallen them? Will heroes triumph and villains come to justice? Will nature be a help or harm to the community at risk? What will be the final outcome of all this striving and hoping?

In the final chapter of his prophecy, Isaiah tells us where the anguish of his generation is going in the long run. The God of creation will gather all nations – not just Israel, but even nations that have never heard of Israel's God – and draw them together into a single community united in a common hope. This prophecy is both a consolation and a warning. God intends to bless all the earth, so we might want to reconsider any stances of exclusion.

» Are there people I would prefer to leave out of the master plan of divine rescue? What steps can I take toward peace and reconciliation?

SECOND READING

HEBREWS 12:5-7, 11-13

"For whom the Lord loves, he disciplines."

Nothing good happens in a classroom without discipline. When a teacher loses control of the students, chaos ensues and the lesson goes up in smoke. Parents, too, know that one important way to love a child is to set constraints on his or her freedom. Such discipline keeps a child safe from harm and also allows the child to grow in the incalculable blessing of self-control.

We train our pets, of course, so they make better companions in our co-habitation. In more subtle ways we even train each other: in the home, the workplace, and the special sphere of friendship. This subtle shaping of the terms of our relationship has led me to know, for example, not to talk to my friend Erin before she has her morning coffee. It informs me that my siblings need to drop out of sight now and then to tend to their inner work. We teach each other how to avoid pressing buttons or how to frame bad news so we can hear it more readily. And in all these ways and more, we learn how to love each other well.

GOSPEL

LUKE 13:22-30

"Lord, will only a few people be saved?"

Isaiah and Jesus seem to be having an ideological fistfight this weekend! Isaiah says the way to salvation is wide and user-friendly. Jesus insists the gate of admission is narrow and "many" who expect to get in will find the door closed in their faces. We Christians suspect that in matters of doctrine, Jesus is a bigger authority than Isaiah. But the truth is, it makes us uneasy when the Bible apparently contradicts itself.

Yet both authorities are making the same claim to different audiences. In the sixth century BC, Isaiah's community had just returned from Babylonian exile and was understandably down on non-Israelites. Not so fast, the prophet says: will you reject those whom God welcomes to share in divine blessings? Meanwhile, the crowd around Jesus was plenty sure they were God's darlings and everyone else was an abomination. So Jesus points out that the gate will close on the self-righteous, even as it opens for folks in all four directions. Isaiah and Jesus are, despite their Testaments, on the same page.

» What's required for entry into the reign of God: amassing sacraments, keeping commandments, showing mercy, or – ?
