

"If you knew the gift of God!" [Jn. 4:10] The wonder of prayer is revealed beside the well where we come seeking water: there, Christ comes to meet every human being. It is he who first seeks us and asks us for a drink. Jesus thirsts; his asking arises from the depths of God's thirst with ours. God thirsts that we may thirst for him."⁸ (CCC, 2560) The Catechism of the Catholic Church 8: Cf. St. Augustine, De diversis quaestionibus octoginta tribus 64, 4: PL 40, 56.

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus approaches the woman at the well with no hesitation. Throughout their conversation, Jesus shows the woman that he truly knows her, that she is not a stranger. How can you open yourself up to God this Lent so that you can know him, like he knows you?

What are the Scrutinies? Just as the season of Lent calls each of us to a 40 day journey with Christ in preparation for Easter, those in the RCIA are called to a period of more intense spiritual preparation as they journey towards full initiation in the Catholic faith. Our catechumens have now entered into the *period of purification and enlightenment*. This period includes the three *"Scrutinies*" for the unbaptized (known as *"the elect")* on the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Sundays of Lent., We will celebrate the scrutinies at Immaculate Conception at the 11:30am mass.

These rites engage the entire parish community in the RCIA process. The three Scrutinies are meant to bring a growth to holiness. Each includes prayers of exorcism as well as invocations to God meant to uncover and then heal what is weak, defective, or sinful in hearts while strengthening what is good, strong, and holy in the lives of not only the elect, but the entire assembly as they travel a journey of conversion with those in the RCIA. The prayers of the scrutinies are based on the gospel readings from Cycle A: the Samaritan woman at the well, the man born blind, and the raising of Lazarus. These stories, all rich in meaning, will guide them in searching their hearts and opening them to Jesus. Please keep our elect and their sponsors in your prayers during this time of preparation.

Saint Joseph, Husband of Mary--March 19 Saint Watch

The Bible pays Joseph the highest compliment: he was a "just" man. The quality meant a lot more than faithfulness in paying debts.

When the Bible speaks of God "justifying" someone, it means that God, the all-holy or "righteous" one, so transforms a person that the individual shares somehow in God's own holiness, and hence it is really "right" for God to love him or her. In other words, God is not playing games, acting as if we were lovable when we are not.

By saying Joseph was "just," the Bible means that he was one who was completely open to all that God wanted to do for him. He became holy by opening himself totally to God.

The rest we can easily surmise. Think of the kind of love with which he wooed and won Mary, and the depth of the love they shared during their marriage.

It is no contradiction of Joseph's manly holiness that he decided to divorce Mary when she was found to be with child. The important words of the Bible are that he planned to do this "quietly" because he was "a righteous man, yet unwilling to expose her to shame" (Matthew 1:19).

The just man was simply, joyfully, wholeheartedly obedient to God—in marrying Mary, in naming Jesus, in shepherding the precious pair to Egypt, in bringing them to Nazareth, in the undetermined number of years of quiet faith and courage.

The spouse of Mary the mother of Jesus and the legal father of Jesus according to Jewish law, Joseph is a model of humility and obedience to God's will. He followed God's instructions, given by angels in dreams, and took the pregnant Mary into his home as his wife, protected her and Jesus at the child's birth in Bethlehem through the family's sojourn in Egypt, and provided for them as a carpenter in Nazareth. He is the patron saint of carpenters, the dying, and workers.

"St Joseph persevered in this mission with fidelity and love. The Church, therefore, offers him to us as an exceptional model of service to Christ and to his mysterious plan of salvation. And she calls upon him as the special patron and protector of the whole family of believers. In a special way, Joseph is presented to us on his feast day as the saint under whose powerful protection divine Providence has wished to place the persons and ministry of all who are called to be "fathers" and "guardians" among the Christian people." THE CONVERSATION DEEPENS : THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT

FIRST READING

EXODUS 17:3-7

So Moses cried out to the LORD, "What shall I do with this people?"

God and Moses: what a pair! Moses didn't know God when his life was rescued at the hour of birth by swift-acting midwives. Or during the period when his mother hid him, or his sister watched over him in a reed basket at the Nile. Or when a bathing princess discovered the basket and adopted him. For all the years Moses received divine and human protections, he was completely unaware of it.

It's only after an adult Moses murders an Egyptian and goes on the lam that he runs into God. He's not in what we traditionally called a state of grace. He isn't primed for a sacred encounter. But God comes to him anyway in the burning bush, and Moses starts a conversation that will last a lifetime. The dialogue isn't always easy and sometimes grows quite heated. Among intimates, even a quarrel can be a form of love and trust.

» How do your arguments with those you love differ from disagreements with others?

SECOND READING

ROMANS 5:1-2, 5-8

Indeed, only with difficulty does one die for a just person....

Many of us would give our lives to save a loved one. Some among us, including firefighters, police officers, and soldiers, routinely sacrifice themselves for strangers. It is much rarer that any of us would entertain the idea of risking our lives for someone we dislike or disapprove of. An enemy would be the least likely recipient of our self-sacrifice.

Perhaps if we knew that a national hero, genius, or saintly person was in imminent danger, we would put our lives on the line for someone we deemed more worthy or necessary. But if the person in danger of death were some scoundrel, would we leap up to take the bullet? Yet Jesus chooses to die for sinners, as we tell it. Jesus hangs on the cross for scoundrels like us. Only in heaven does such a decision make sense.

» Few of us will face martyrdom for our faith. But if not to die for Jesus, how are we willing to live for him?

GOSPEL

JOHN 4:5-42

His disciples were amazed that Jesus was talking with a woman.

It's the 21st century. Fewer of us than ever are shocked that a woman might have something to say worth hearing. Catholics, at least, shouldn't be surprised when God chooses the conversation with a girl in Nazareth as the turning point of salvation history. Still, we might forgive the disciples of twenty centuries ago for needing to suppress the urge to ask Jesus: "Why are you talking with her?"

Because this was a conversation that shouldn't be happening. The woman says it herself: you're a Jewish man and I'm a Samaritan woman. What could we say to each other that won't involve us in some sin? Jesus initiates a conversation anyway. And it turns out they have a good deal to talk about. The encounter changes the woman's life and those of her people as well. Maybe it's time to attempt more impossible conversations.

Which conversations are you not a part of that might hold some hidden harvest?
